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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (Online) reports that Queensland Health has revealed a "sharp uptick in flu cases" over the seven days to June 18, and comes as the state government scraps its Covid-19 monitoring system. "It is not the time for complacency" Queensland Health Minister Shannon Fentiman said, adding that "The virus is still out there as well as influenza and RSV, so we need to take care."
- The Canberra Times (page 4) reports that the ACT Minister for Health Emma Davidson has announced that a new inpatient mental health unit for teens will open in the coming weeks at Canberra's women's and children's hospital. "We know that there are a lot of young people who really get a lot of value out of being able to access services but being able to do it in a space that is designed for them just makes it so much better," Ms Davidson said.
- The Herald Sun (page 7) reports that new research by the Queensland University of Technology has found complications after cosmetic breast augmentation are more common than other cosmetic plastic surgery but women who undergo such procedures are often uninformed regarding the risks.

- The Courier Mail (page 6) reports that Queensland's Covid traffic light system is set to come to
 an end, with the virus expected to be monitored the same as any other respiratory illness. Chief
 heath officer John Gerrard said Covid was still "very common" in the community, but the state
 was not seeing the same surges as last year. adding that "As the Covid pandemic evolves so
 does our response here in Queensland."
- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 3) reports that a shortage of midwives will result in birthing services at Whyalla Hospital being halted from Monday. Flinders and Upper North Local Health Network said it was seeking qualified staff and hoped to resume services as soon as possible. Antenatal and post-natal care is still available at the facility, as is the emergency department for maternal emergencies.
- The Hobart Mercury (page 1) reports that Calvary Health Care is considering expanding its services to cover a shortfall in mental health and maternal care following the closure of the St Helen's Private Hospital on Friday. The Tasmanian state government is in talks to establish a new mother-baby unit, including talks with Calvary.
- NEWS.com.au reports that experts are warning a new COVID strain called FU.1 detected in
 Asia and India may pose the next big threat to Victoria as it is now spreading worldwide at a 50
 per cent faster rate than the Arcturus (XBB.1.16) strain. An average of 16 Victorians a day have
 died of COVID in the past week, up from nine the week before.
