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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sun Herald (page 4) reports the Australian Sonographers Association has called for sonographers to be regulated by the Medical Radiation Practice Board of Australia, citing a rise in insurance claims for incorrect or missed diagnoses based on poor-quality ultrasounds. A Department of Health and Aged Care spokesperson said the system is "well regulated" by governments, independent regulators and employers.
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 15) reports the Department of Health and Aged Care has warned that respiratory syncytial virus is spreading at ten times the rate of last winter. Australians are urged to be vigilant for cold-like symptoms, as the disease can be fatal to infants, the elderly and the immunocompromised. - The Sun Herald (page 1) reports six children presented to NSW emergency departments between June 21 and 29 with severe reactions after vaping, with symptoms including vomiting, seizures and loss of consciousness. Some of the vapes were purchased illegally from sellers

on Snapchat, NSW Health said. A regulatory crackdown on e-cigarettes aimed at curtailing the black market in nicotine vapes was announced by Minister for Health Mark Butler in May.

- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 10) reports Far North Queensland breast cancer survivor Sharyn Washington has accused Queensland Health of ignoring her case after waiting 614 days for reconstructive surgery following a mastectomy. Minister for Health Shannon Fentiman said she will urge health services to investigate after Ms Washington wrote to the Minister and her state and federal representatives Cynthia Lui and Bob Katter. Mr Katter said he had passed the letter on to federal health minister Mark Butler. - The Sunday Age (page 1) reports mothers and newborns are being discharged from hospital after a record-low average of two days following an uncomplicated birth, with one in 10 leaving within 24 hours, prompting concern that women are being sent home in pain and without appropriate support in order to free up hospital beds. "When it comes to discharge, it shouldn't be a matter of being told you're ready to go," said Australian College of Midwives chief midwife Alison Weatherstone. "It should be a conversation with the woman to prepare for discharge from the facility." Also reported by: Sun Herald (Sydney).
- The Sunday Herald Sun (page 7) reports more than a third of Victoria's emergency
 presentations for sports-related concussions in the five years to 2022 were for youths aged 1014, according to the Victorian Injury Surveillance Unit. Macquarie University neurologist Dr
 Rowena Mobbs warned hospital data under-reports the issue and young people are at risk of
 more severe or prolonged concussion.
- The Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 12) reports a Senate inquiry has heard people with ADHD are increasingly turning to self-medication with illicitly-obtained drugs due to a lack of public services and long waiting lists. "Unfortunately, access to care is limited, with many public sector mental health services not providing any ADHD services," RACGP president Nicole Higgins said.
