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### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The <u>Sunday Age</u> (page 1) reports Minister for Health Mark Butler said allegations aired on Saturday that the \$20 billion Medical Research Future Fund had disbursed funds without due process and with political interference are "concerning". "Last month, I announced a consultation on the future of medical research funding in Australia, including the governance and administration of the Medical Research Future Fund," Minister Butler said. "That consultation process closed this week." The Department of Health and Aged Care, which controls the fund, said a 2021 Australian National Audit Office review of the Fund found its governance arrangements "largely effective" and that the department is equipped "to provide assurance that grant applications are assessed on their merit and represent value for money." The Australian Firefighters Alliance has called the decision "a breach of human rights".
   State Shadow Minister for Health Georgie Crozier said "There is absolutely no reason why

Covid vaccine mandates are required in the FRV, especially now that WorkSafe regulations have expired [on July 12]."

- The <u>Sunday Times</u> (page 1) reports Western Australia's Department of Health is contacting GPs and issuing SMS alerts to parents in a bid to raise child vaccination rates, with a horror influenza season so far claiming the lives of three children. Only 22.5 percent of the state's under-fives have been immunized and 18 percent of children aged five to 12.

## Children's flu deaths spark health warning

Australia's complacency around influenza has led to soaring cases of the disease and an increase in deaths, experts have warned. There have been 116,473 flu notifications reported to the National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System between January 1 to June 25, as well as 107 influenza-associated deaths and 1236 hospitalisations.
