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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 1) reports that staff raised concerns with management about a "culture of bullying and intimidation" in the acute psychiatric ward of Parramatta's Cumberland more than a year before the death of two nurses now at the centre of a criminal case against NSW Health. A 2019 union meeting raised safety and cultural issues on the ward which were then forwarded to management.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 1) reports that a father of a patient of controversial neurosurgeon Charlie Teo has spoken out after Dr Teo made statements to Channel Seven's Spotlight program. Gene Howard said Dr Teo had accused him of lying about his daughter's case, and a number of families are reportedly frustrated with Dr Teo's refusal to accept a recent standard committee's judgement that he had acted with "unsatisfactory professional conduct".
- The Age (page 1) reports a doctor will appeal a coroners ruling he provided substandard care
 to an Indigenous woman who later died in prison. Court documents claim the coroner Simon
 McGregor made six errors and misapplied legal principles in establishing Dr Sean Runacres
 had acted improperly.

- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that four out of nine federal government funded urgent care clinics in Victoria are operating on reduced hours, with one only operating only four days out of seven due to doctor shortages. A health department spokesperson said "The Australian government has committed to properly resourcing Medicare UCCs and is working with state and territory governments and other stakeholders on options to leverage the available workforce while building capability in urgent care."
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that a Victorian parliamentary inquiry may be launched into the funding of the failed Commonwealth Games. Members of the Liberals and Nationals said they would push for transparency around the costings quoted as reason for the cancellation.

 after positive impacts were noted in domestic violence rates. Senator Malarndirri McCarthy
 said, "The statistics showing a drop in alcohol-related harm and violence in Central Australia
