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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Sunday Age</u> (page 1) reports that influenza B cases have spiked to 25,960 in Victoria and around 150,000 nationally, prompting doctors to urge parents to ensure their children are vaccinated. "Kids are set up because the flu is the first big hit and then the secondary bacterial infection is the second big hit," said National Centre for Immunisation Research and Surveillance director Professor Kristine Macartney. "That's been landing a proportion of the children in our intensive care unit and on heart-lung machines."
- The <u>Sunday Tasmanian</u> (page 1) reports Tasmanian scientists have called for water supplies
 to be tested for BMAA, a toxin linked to illnesses including motor neurone disease that is
 produced in outbreaks of blue-green algae. Water authority TasWater has assured Tasmanians
 "their water is absolutely safe to drink and meets Australian Drinking Water Guideline
 requirements."
- The <u>Sunday Canberra Times</u> (page 3) reports concerns that 14 of 39 imaging machines in use at Canberra Hospital are past their nominal end of useful life have been rebuffed by ACT Health Minister Rachel Stephen-Smith. "The machines will continue to function beyond that time frame that is prescribed and particularly around X-rays they are continuing to work perfectly well in the environment that they are in," Ms Stephen-Smith told the parliament's budget committee.

- The <u>Sunday Mail Brisbane</u> (page 4) reports around 340 junior doctors will be rotated through Queensland's regional general practices and primary care facilities over the next two years, thanks to a \$17 million grant by the federal government's John Flynn Prevocational Doctor Program. "Ensuring that people who live in rural and regional areas can get the health care they need closer to home is a priority for the Australian government," said Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler. The Department of Health has said all 58 facilities will be operational by the end of the year. Mental Health Minister Emma Davidson said that the hospital did not admit any child or teenage patients while the man was employed.
- The <u>Sunday Herald Sun</u> (page 10) reports Melbourne urologist Dr Christopher Love is urging greater awareness among young people on emerging links between vaping and erectile dysfunction. One United States study "basically showed that if you vaped daily, you had twice the chance of developing erectile dysfunction compared to someone who doesn't vape," said Dr Love. Nicotine is already known to affect sexual performance, he added "Vapes have that, let alone the other chemicals we still don't know about." From Brigitte Bardot's Bambi vibe to Kim Kardashian's voluminous ones, long, luscious eyelashes have been in vogue for decades. While women in the 1960s relied on falsies to achieve the look, today lash serums have had a meteoric rise, becoming one of the biggest sellers in the beauty world. [...] Some serums contain hormone-like substances called prostaglandin analogues, which are traditionally used to treat the eye disease, glaucoma. While these work efficiently for medical use, they're not approved for use in lash serums and are banned in several countries, including Australia and Canada.

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RSV vax gets the OK in Europe

The world's first vaccine for infants and those over 60 against RSV has been approved by Europe's drug watchdog, two months after it was approved in the US. The medicine, Abrysvo, made by Pfizer, is under evaluation by Australia's Therapeutic Goods Administration.

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
