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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 1) reports surgeons are exploiting taxpayer-funded efforts to reduce Victoria's elective surgery waitlist, cancelling procedures on weekdays and rescheduling them for evenings and weekends to collect higher fees, industry insiders have warned. Two anonymous whistleblowers said the program was open to abuse and called for an urgent review by the Auditor-General.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 1) reports Queenslanders will be able to access free flu vaccinations from Saturday until the end of August as the state grapples with a "horror" flu season that has already claimed 56 lives. New diagnostic criteria for the condition were unveiled at the Alzheimer's Association international conference in the

- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 2) reports a government crackdown on vapes will only further entrench their black market availability, health experts have warned in a letter to be sent to MPs today. The letter, signed by 43 public health and addiction experts from Australia and New Zealand, calls for the proposed crackdown on vaping to be paused while further expert consultation occurs. *Also reported by: <u>Herald Sun</u>, <u>Geelong Advertiser</u>, <u>The Medical Republic</u>*
- The Australian (page 3) reports the discovery by Australian scientists of how a special white blood cell is created could lead to new treatment methods for cancer or vaccines for infectious diseases like strep A, tuberculosis and Covid. Murdoch Children's Research Institute leader of Cellular Immunology Daniel Pellicci said "Knowing this information about how these cells develop allows us to boost their numbers, which could make them more advantageous to combating infections through vaccines and cancer immunotherapies". - The <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 3) reports New South Wales Health is facing criminal prosecutions over allegations it failed in its duty of care over two nurses working in an acute mental health ward at Cumberland Hospital who died within weeks of each other in 2020. NSW Health employees have claimed the nurses were suspended from the hospital without any details in late 2020 and believed they were being discriminated against because they were in a same-sex relationship.
- The Australian (page 7) reports poor practices including "rushed" telehealth appointments and online quizzes are placing people at risk of being misdiagnosed with ADHD, Institute of Clinical Psychologists president Marjorie Collins says. Perth-based clinical psychologist Derek Cohen said "It is easy to tease out who is offering a legitimate method, from those who are really just providing an expensive screening service, because the aim of an assessment is a differential diagnosis."
- The Australian (page 7) reports concerns about expanded diagnostic powers for nurses to prescribe abortion medication have been criticised as "insulting, patronising, and out of touch with reality." Australian College of Nursing chief executive Kylie Ward said "Nurse practitioners are highly trained professionals who know their responsibilities in prescribing the abortion pill, provide ongoing care and management, and respond rapidly to any potential changes in wellbeing."
