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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Age</u> (page 1) reports Australia's sports sector has lashed the Victorian government's decision not to host the 2026 Commonwealth Games. Commonwealth Games Australia CEO Craig Phillips said budget estimates showing a \$7 billion cost for the Games were "grossly exaggerated" and risked damaging Victoria's reputation as a world-class host for sporting events. *Also reported by: <u>The Australian</u>, <u>Canberra Times, Herald Sun, West Australian, ABC News</u>*
- The <u>Adelaide Advertiser</u> (page 1) reports a nuclear waste dump will no longer be built on native title land in the South Australian town of Kimba after a Federal Court found a decision by former federal resources minister Keith Pitt had been made with "apprehension of bias" and "prejudgement". Legal questions remain over the date from which the Ministerial ruling is cancelled, but Barngarla Determination Aboriginal Corporation chief executive Jason Bilney said the ruling was a victory "for all First Nations people". *Also reported by: <u>ABC News</u>, <u>The Guardian</u>, <u>The New Daily</u>, <u>SBS</u>, <u>7News</u>*
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 3) reports dementia researchers are calling for governments to urgently prepare the health system to facilitate earlier diagnosis and intervention processes for Alzheimer's disease as trials reveal new medications can slow cognitive decline. Curtin

 the study found diet affected the health of a mother's breastmilk which was crucial to triggering
 a baby's immunity to severe lower respiratory infections.
- The <u>Northern Territory News</u> (page 5) reports the Territory government is launching a new campaign aimed at reducing teen vaping rates. Cancer Council NT chief executive Tanya Izod said that young adults may not know how much nicotine was contained within vaping products, and how addictive it could be. *Also reported by: <u>Northern Territory News</u>*
- The <u>West Australian</u> (page 7) reports the National Lung Cancer Screening Program will be a major step forward in detecting lung cancer early in the 20 per cent of patients who are nonsmokers. The program has been approved and funded by Minister for Health and Aged Care Mark Butler, and is expected to be in operation by 2025.
- The <u>WA Today</u> (Online) reports TAFE nursing graduate numbers in West Australia fell 40 per cent between 2017 and 2022 despite a state government program making courses free. WA's Training Minister Simone McGurk said enrolment numbers had seen a revival over the last year, with total enrolments up more than 20 per cent.
- <u>The Mandarin</u> reports outgoing Health secretary Professor Brendan Murphy has welcomed the commitment from Minister for Health Mark Butler to address necessary health workforce reforms that were pushed back due to the pandemic. Professor Murphy said his successor, Blair Comley, would inherit the reforms with the support of a strong APS team.

Stokes says the new drug will only be effective for people at the very earliest stages of the disease. She notes the new drug Donanemab has to be infused intravenously, which means that it requires a specialist to administer the drug and to keep a close eye over people. She states they want to see the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme to be able to subsidise medications like this to make them more available.

A new drug which slows Alzheimer's disease, has been hailed a turning point in the treatment of the debilitating disease. Australian researchers involved in the global trial say it is the most significant breakthrough in decades. The medication slowed disease progression by 35% in the early stages of Alzheimer's.
