EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 1) reports a nurse at the centre of a criminal case against
 New South Wales Health claimed she was the victim of sexual harassment, bullying and a
 "toxic and damaging" workplace culture at Parramatta's Cumberland Hospital. The nurse and
 her partner died within months of each other in late 2020 having been suspended by the
 hospital as an unspecified investigation took place.
- The Age (page 1) reports the Commonwealth Games Federation says it will pursue "hundreds of millions" in compensation following Victoria's decision to step down as host of the 2026 event. Ratings agency Moody's analyst John Manning said it was unclear whether state government spending plans for regional housing, sports facilities and tourism in lieu of the Games would have the same economic benefits. - The Australian (page 3) reports people with a type of protective gene have a better immune
 response to COVID and are less likely to display symptoms, researchers from La Trobe
 University and the University of California have found. Carriers of the HLA-B15 gene are
 between two and eight times more likely to be asymptomatic if infected with COVID, while their

T Cells recognise the presence of the virus faster and provide a more active early response.

- The Australian (page 3) reports COVID mortality rates were almost 10 per cent higher than expected across the first three months of 2023, but remained lower than the same time last year when the Omicron variant was prevalent, new data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics has shown. ABS head of health statistics Lauren Moran said "We've seen this year that from February, there has been a slowdown of Covid mortality, but as the data for the winter months becomes available we would expect that to go up, as it did last year."
- The Australian (page 5) reports a government university review has missed a "historic moment" by failing to recommend increased research investment, Science and Technology Australia chief executive Misha Schubert says. Mr Schubert said Australian universities risked being "out-muscled by ... economic rivals in the global race to seize new jobs, industries and national income."
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 5) reports people with bipolar are six times more likely to die young due to external causes like accidents, violence and suicide, new international research has found. Compared to people without bipolar, people with the disorder were found to be twice as likely to die from physical illnesses including heart disease, stroke and cancer, while alcohol-related deaths accounted for almost half of those deaths.
- The Australian (page 7) reports people with diabetes and Indigenous Australians will be urged to have their risk of heart disease assessed from a younger age under updates to the Australian Guidelines for Assessing and Managing Disease Risk. The review includes an update to Australia's cardiovascular disease risk calculator based on new postcode datasets and guidelines for doctors around reclassifying heart disease risk estimates.
- The Guardian reports the Department of Health and Aged Care should explain the reasoning behind a multi-million dollar grant awarded to a PwC-backed startup through a closed, non-competitive process, policy experts and transparency watchdogs say. The grant for a digital platform aimed at improving mental health outcomes was awarded to Innowell Pty Ltd in 2017. A department spokesperson said "The decision to directly fund Innowell, and not go to open tender, was a decision of the government at the time."
