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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian Financial Review (page 1) reports a taskforce assembled by Aged Care Minister Anika Wells to consider the challenges facing the sector has focused early meetings on greater means testing and more reliance on a user pays model. Taskforce members are understood to have voiced support for a tax or levy to boost aged care, following recommendations made by a royal commission during the Morrison administration.
- The Age (page 1) reports that Melton has the highest rate of diabetes out of all Melbourne suburbs with 8.2 per cent of residents reporting they have the disease. Census data found diabetes was more prevalent in suburbs with higher rates of disadvantage, with Professor Elif Ekinci from the the Australian Centre for Accelerating Diabetes Innovations stating that people on lower-incomes tend to have less food knowledge and less time to do physical activity.
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that researchers from the Baker Heart and Diabetes Institute have developed AI software that will hopefully be able to detect declining heart failure over the phone. 200 Australians with heart failure will test the software that will analyse breathlessness and disease severity through an app on their phone. - The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that the latest ambulance ramping data has revealed some Queensland patients are waiting more than 10 hours on stretchers to get into the state's hospitals. Health Minister Shannon Fentiman said "The QAS is the busiest ambulance service in the country, responding to 1.2 million incidents a year, and is the only mainland state that is free," while Opposition Leader David Crisafulli claimed that ambulance ramping was a "barometer" of the health of the hospital network."
- <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 1) reports that Gold Coast Mayor Tom Tate has continued to advocate for
 the 2026 Commonwealth Games to be held on the Gold Coast, which he believes could be
 staged there for \$1bn. Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk ruled out Queensland hosting the 2026
 games last week, stating that the government's focus is on preparing for the 2032 Olympics and
 Paralympics.
- <u>The Age</u> (page 6) reports Health Minister Mark Butler says government research funding should be awarded through an independent peer-review process, saying he has long held concerns about the degree of ministerial involvement. Mr Butler said "[The government's] focus is on putting in place the most robust governance and administration arrangements to the MRFF for the future."

Psychiatrists reveal 'alarming' issues in youth healthcare
