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### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Australian (page 1) reports a suspended psychiatrist has filed a complaint against Queensland Children's Hospital, claiming she was forced to comply with gender-affirming policies. Dr Jillian Spencer, who has expressed past dissatisfaction with gender-affirming care, in a complaint to the Queensland Human Rights Commissioner said she believed the state's policies "seemed inconsistent with best medical practice of taking an evidence-led holistic approach to child and adolescent psychiatry."
- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u> (page 1) reports peak psychiatrist and psychologist groups are
  calling to widen NDIS eligibility for thousands of Australians diagnosed with ADHD. A
  spokesperson for NDIS Minister Bill Shorten said, "People with ADHD can become NDIS
  participants if they meet the criteria of being permanently and significantly disabled and provide
  evidence showing they meet the requirements set out in the NDIS Act." Also reported by: <u>The</u>

- The Age (page 3) reports the Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency (AHPRA) has
  received double the number of sexual misconduct complaints about health professionals in the
  2022-23 year compared to 2018-19. The agency has reportedly hired additional staff to assist

- The <u>Canberra Times</u> (page 3) reports a new world-leading health research and treatment
  facility will be constructed by Australian National University on a former car park site bought for
  \$16.75 million from the ACT government. ANU vice-chancellor Brian Schmidt said "We will use
  this site to bring together research, teaching, policy, treatment and public engagement to
  understand and meet Australia's future health needs, which is a key part of our mission as the
  national university."
- The <u>Canberra Times</u> (page 4) reports retiring health secretary Professor Brendan Murphy has
  warned that influenza was likely the "highest risk area" for future pandemics in Australia.
  Professor Murphy said that the COVID pandemic better prepared the Health Department and
  the country for another outbreak, including domestic vaccine production and a stronger
  emphasis on medical stockpiles.
- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 4) reports NSW healthcare workers are preparing to continue industrial action on Monday if negotiations between state Health Minister Ryan Park and the Health Services Union are unable to reach an agreement. The HSU previously gave a Friday deadline to respond to their demands for improved pay and conditions, including a 6 per cent pay rise.
- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 11) reports children under 16 years are being urged to get a flu vaccine this winter as New South Wales combats a severe outbreak of influenza B. NSW chief health officer Kerry Chant said the virus would likely have a "greater impact on school-aged children", and warned the concern amongst doctors was "palpable".
