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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Saturday Age (page 1) reports that Australian Sports Commission Chief Executive Kieren Perkins has expressed disappointment at the collapse of Canada's bid to host the 2030 Commonwealth Games, as the Victorian government attempts to navigate the fallout after dumping the event. "One of the frustrating things about the way the Victorian decision has been made is it has perpetuated this idea that the Commonwealth Games are epically expensive to put on," said Perkins, "We need to get back to basics and understand how you make it worthwhile and deliver it in a fiscally responsible way. I still believe that is possible."
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that a lack of available mental health beds has been blamed for a 16-year-old girl being kept in leg and wrist restraints for 12 days at Melbourne's Northern Hospital. "The NDIS and the mental health sector have cost the taxpayer millions of dollars in emergency services managing my daughter," the girl's mother said, "In an ideal world there would be no restrictive practices, but if you shut them all down then I worry the only place left for her is a jail cell."
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that a chronic shortage of key medical specialists has meant biopsy results are taking months to reach Queenslanders with suspected cancers. "The concern is that we're delaying treatment plans for the odd one that does come back with

cancer. It's four to six weeks now before they get a result," a Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital informant said.

- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 1) reports that a video played last month at a Community Concussion Research Foundation forum has showed some of the 20 concussions suffered by Port Adelaide AFL player Jay Schulz over his time at the club. "So many players were allowed to play concussed and returned to play too early. Many of them are now suffering from BTI (brain trauma injury), or having the early onset of brain and head issues," Adelaide lawyer Greg Griffin said. The Port Adelaide Football Club were recently issued a \$100,000 fine for failing to adhere to AFL concussion protocols.
- The Saturday Age (page 5) reports that doctors have warned that Victoria's system of emergency departments are crumbling, with the number of people waiting more than 24 hours for treatment increasing significantly. 3567 patients were stuck in emergency departments for more than 24 hours between April and June as they waited for an available bed, more than double compared to the same period last year, health performance data shows.
- The Courier Mail (page 6) reports that legal challenges have stalled an investigation into two surgeons at a major Brisbane South hospital more than three years into the process. Health Minister Shannon Fentiman has confirmed there are four major investigations occurring across the Queensland Health system.
- The West Australian (page 7) reports that doctors have been angered by a move which will
 allow pharmacists to start providing diagnosis and treatment for women in WA suffering urinary
 tract infections. "Any woman can present to a trained pharmacist," Health Minister Amber-Jade
 Sanderson said, "This is for simple, straightforward episodes of UTI..."Those with a more
 complex history should see their GP."
