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## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The <u>Sunday Age</u> (page 1) reports standard GP consultations in Victoria dropped by one fifth between 2019 and 2023, with patients deterred by rising living costs and fewer clinics offering bulk-billing under two thirds of Australians now have all their appointments bulk-billed, according to Department of Health data. Minister for Health Mark Butler said GPs will soon see a tripling of bulk-billing incentives for no-gap services to child, senior and concessional patients, on top of a \$1.5 billion Medicare rebate indexation boost.
- The <u>Sun Herald</u> (page 1) reports mental health not-for-profit Smiling Minds is backing a renewed call by National Children's Commissioner Anne Hollonds for the appointment of a federal minister for children, as psychologists record rising levels of anxiety and mental illness in children of primary school age. The portfolio of Early Childhood and Youth, held by Anne Aly, covers children under 5 and people aged 12 to 25 but policy for five-to-12-year-olds falls to assorted ministries, such as a \$192 million program to fund mental health and wellbeing initiatives in schools announced by Minister for Education Jason Clare and Assistant Minister for Mental Health Emma McBride. - The <u>Sunday Mail Adelaide</u> (page 1) reports the number of patients in SA hospital emergency departments forced to wait over 24 hours for a ward bed more than tripled from 2,655 in 2017-

18 to 8,843 last financial year. From June to July this year, ambulance ramping hours rose from 3,105 to 3,354. AMA vice president Dr Annette Barratt said she is hopeful that recent award agreements restoring parity with other states will begin to address the state's critical shortage of both specialists and GPs. "We are committed to a women's and baby hospital at the QEII site, and until we see any other evidence to illustrate it should be anywhere else, that will not change," Ms Mettam said.

  terminations for many women will be little improved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration's
  easing of abortion pill restrictions as long as regional and rural areas remain under-resourced.
  An auditor-general's report in May found 17 local government areas lacked surgical or medical
  termination services. "Victorians shouldn't have to travel across the state or empty their bank
  account to access basic healthcare," said Greens MLC and health spokeswoman Sarah
  Mansfield.
