EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports a Senate inquiry into school refusal has called for extra
 Medicare rebates for child psychology to better support mental health care for students. The
 inquiry found the anxiety and trauma that often prompted school refusal stemmed from bullying
 and neurodivergence.
- The Daily Telegraph (page 1) reports that the NSW Government has announced an incentive to help health workers fill regional shortages, offering up to \$20,000 in support for those moving to regional areas. All regional health districts in NSW are facing nursing shortages, particularly those with emergency qualifications.
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that a lack of appropriate equipment has been blamed for healthcare workers using their phone torches to examine patients at an Ipswich Hospital. A review of the hospital made 9 recommendations following a patient's complaint about her care at the facility, with Queensland Health confirming the changes will be rolled out at hospitals across the state.
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that staff at Sunshine Coast University Hospital say shifts have been cut and junior nurses left unsupervised as the Queensland government looks to

recoup a \$40 million debt. With efficiency measures put in place to find savings in the state's health system since 2018, Nurses Professional Association of Queensland president Marg Gilbert said "The issue of unsafe staffing and skill mixes is of epidemic proportions across all of Queensland Health."

- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 1) reports that Australian medical researchers have pioneered a new bowel cancer detection test that improves detection rates and could pave the way for blood test screening. Using an engineered bacteria, the research team was able to identify the cancer in 100 per cent of samples.
- The West Australian (page 1) reports that the Australian Nursing Federation has said it is considering forming a political party to contest the 2025 Western Australia election to campaign for healthcare changes. The union said that having healthcare experience in Parliament would be beneficial to help fix holes in the system.
- The Australian (page 5) reports that Minister for Aged Care Anika Wells has announced that new data on Thursday indicated that eight in 10 aged-care facilities now had continuous nursing coverage after new regulations were implemented. Minister Wells also said that the aged-care taskforce will examine the use of personal superannuation to cover aged care costs.
- The Australian (page 5) reports that the Australian Medical Association has labelled state and territory government refusal to rule out a new payroll tax for general practitioners a "tax on Medicare". Australian Medical Association president Steve Robson said "The commonwealth government has put together a package to increase funding for patients and GP consultations. Having ... state or territory governments plotting to take it back through payroll tax is an outrage."
- The Australian (page 6) reports that the government's 60-day dispensing reforms are expected to save patients \$1.6 billion over the next four years. "In the three months since I've announced this measure, there have been twice as many applications for new pharmacies to be opened as there were in the same period last year," Health Minister Mark Butler said, "Clearly this sort of massive hit to business confidence that the pharmacy lobby and Coalition have claimed would happen is not being reflected in investment in the pharmacy sector."
- The Age (page 2) reports that Victorian Premier Daniel Andrews has rejected criticism of a \$500,000 spend on consultants to overhaul the state's Ambulance service in the wake of adverse findings by a human rights commission inquiry. Mr Andrews said the spend was a necessary investment in making Ambulance Victoria safer, more professional and more inclusive.
