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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Sun Herald (page 1)</u> reports that a shortfall of almost \$18 million in fundraising and philanthropic revenue over the last two years has forced one of Australia's most prominent mental health charities to restructure, including a number of job losses. Beyond Blue chief executive Georgie Harman said the organisation would change its operational structure to ensure it continued to improve and increase its free mental health support and services.
- <u>The Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 1)</u> reports that a six-year-old boy has passed away from the flu after being sent home by the Riverland General Hospital. It is unconfirmed whether the boy received vaccinations for the flu. A spokesperson for the Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network said, "We have conducted an initial review of the care provided and are confident appropriate diagnostic and medical care was given in line with best practice."
- <u>The Sunday Age (page 9)</u> reports that senior officials from state health departments will receive their first round of advice on the upcoming national disposable vape ban on Wednesday, with details of a start date, scope and funding still being finalised. Health Minister Mark Butler has yet to confirm a timeframe, saying, "We're committed to getting this right and committed to making sure that the arrangements across the country are perfectly aligned, so there are no more loopholes for this public health menace".

- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 10) reports that Queensland's medical community believes there is no transparency on how the Palaszczuk government's \$1.6 billion mental health levy will be used, with just eight mental health beds being added across the state in the year since the levy was introduced by Treasurer Cameron Dick. A Queensland Health spokesman said there were plans for another 126 mental health and alcohol and other drug beds by 2027, in addition to the recruitment of 1400 new staff.
- <u>The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 11)</u> reports that Queensland's mental health sector has expressed its concern over the lack of qualified staff needed to replace almost half of the state's mental health nurses that are expected to retire by 2029. Queensland Alliance for Mental Health CEO Jennifer Black, says workforce shortage is the "single biggest issue" facing the sector, adding that "it is difficult to find well-trained staff, to pay them a competitive salary and to keep them, particularly in rural and remote areas."
