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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Saturday Paper (page 1) reports that serious incidents regarding abuse, sexual assault, neglect and even death are not being reported by staff, who are being ordered by the aged-care regulator to close second-tier notifications without a proper assessment or any assessment at all. "Providers have obligations to contact the police when there has been a sexual assault and we have had cases coming through where there is a serious sexual assault and they haven't done that," an assessor said, "So it's not picked up, and that's our job to regulate that, to make sure the provider has called the police and we miss it because the notification has been closed without a proper review."
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 1) reports that doctors at the Sydney Children's Hospital have expressed concern at a NSW government decision to only perform cardiac bypass procedures at Westmead, saying it will deprive their hospital of the ability to offer life-saving procedures and will put patients at risk. In a statement, medical staff council chair Dr Puneet Singh said NSW Health Minister Ryan Park listened to their concerns, adding that "We are awaiting the outcome."
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that documents filed in the Supreme Court of Victoria have alleged that a scientist from Monash IVF Group set fire to crucial documents to avoid criminal

consequences related to her conduct during research underpinning a breakthrough IVF test. "Many women were told by their doctors that they were unable to produce a normal embryo due to the incorrect results produced by niPGT-A," Margalit Injury Lawyers managing principal Michel Margalit said, "This advice was devastating at the time, and has left lasting emotional scars."

- The Daily Telegraph (page 11) reports that the federal government will provide a \$200 million upgrade to women's sporting facilities and ensure more events like the Matildas are on free TV, in a new program in response the "extraordinary" rise in female participation in community sport. "The Matildas have given us a moment of national inspiration, this is about seizing that opportunity for the next generation, investing in community sporting facilities for women and girls around Australia," Prime Minister Anthony Albanese said, "Sport is a great unifier and a great teacher it brings communities together, it teaches us about teamwork and resilience and the joy of shared success."
- <u>The Canberra Times (page 8)</u> reports that new findings by the Australian Public Service Commission has revealed the Department of Health and Aged Care must take more ownership of "whole-of-system reform." The review pointed to a failure of "previous ministers" to lean on the department for advice, however, it stressed that it should also "maintain system reform policy capabilities regardless of the needs of the minister of the day."
- The Courier Mail (page 8) reports that Queensland Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk has announced \$92 million in funding towards the refurbishment and expansion of Rockhampton Hospital's 23-bed mental health unit. Health Minister Shannon Fentiman said the "brand new start-of-the-art facility" will mean that more beds and essential support services will be available for local residents, adding that the government was aware "regional areas are particularly vulnerable to mental health crises," with construction for the expanded facility set to begin in mid-2024 and be completed by 2026.
- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 4) reports that new data has revealed that the state's emergency departments are being overwhelmed with people seeking treatment for minor ailments. The data, provided by SA Health, indicates that many of these ED presentations could be treated at a GP clinic, a pharmacy or at home.
