- The <u>Hobart Mercury</u> (page 1) reports Tasmania's government has been criticised for
 manipulating language in the frames of reference for a parliamentary inquiry into the state's
 ambulance ramping crisis. State health Minister Guy Barnett has also denied claims
 ambulances and patients waiting outside Royal Hobart Hospital's emergency department were
 shifted to improve the optics of his inaugural press conference last month. Also reported by:

- The <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 3) reports healthcare workers at Sydney's Concord Hospital have alleged senior staff threatened disciplinary action to prevent them going public with negative allegations about the hospital's operations. Staff say hospital data has been forged, waiting lists manipulated and patients put at risk by a backlog of over 40,000 radiological scans and outdated medical equipment.
- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 3) reports weight loss medication Wegovy can reduce the risk of heart attack and strokes by up to 20 per cent, new data from a large-scale trial by the Iverson Health Innovation research Institute and Swinburne University has found. Heart Foundation chief medical adviser Gary Jennings said "The top-line results [for Wegovy] have not been seen

- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 5) reports calls about poisoning from vapes to Victoria's poisons hotline have risen more than 75 per cent in the last year, while cases involving children under the age of four have more than doubled. VicHealth chief Sandro Demaio said "My message to parents is that these products are not safe and they're not safe to have in a home. These products are deadly and dangerous and they are designed to attract and manipulate children."
- The Australian (page 7) reports Health Minister Mark Butler will hold talks with crossbenchers overnight to prevent the Coalition from scrapping changes to medication dispensing rules. Mr Butler said the cost-of-living relief measure was "good for health" and would "free up millions of GP consults that we desperately need for important health conditions rather than routine scripts being issued by doctors". AMA president Steve Robson said "While health ministers appear more than willing to increase the workload of the AHPRA, you do not appear willing to help support this work with extra funding and have simply decided to impose what is effectively a tax on the profession."
- The Age (page 14) reports the EG5.1 or Eris variant of COVID-19's Omicron on the rise in
 Asia, Europe and the US has been detectable in Australia since April and is unlikely to cause a
 new wave of infection, experts say. NSW infectious diseases modeller Associate Professor
 James Wood said "we may still need to see one or two additional spike mutations on top of
 these changes before these start to move the needle on wave risk". Also reported by:
