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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Courier Mail</u> (page 1) reports that Mater director of Infectious Disease Paul Griffin has dismissed the proposed link between historical flu peaks around Ekka time as "coindicidence."
 "I think it is probably largely a coincidence most years although it is a fairly large gathering so it does have the potential to facilitate some spread, particularly to some rural areas," Dr Griffin said, "I think most of the season peaking around the time at the Ekka is largely a coincidence."
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 3) reports that Opposition leader Peter Dutton will support a \$500m community sporting infrastructure fund for local and grassroots sporting facilities. Mr Dutton has also criticised Anthony Albanese's response to the Matildas FIFA World Cup success, stating the Prime Minister has made it all about him. "We are opposed to Mr Albanese's public holiday and we are announcing a policy that will instead make a lasting difference to the community and the lives of our young people," stated Mr Dutton. *Also reported by: Daily Telegraph, West Australian*
- <u>Adelaide Advertiser</u> (page 3) reports that the State Coroner is investigating the death of a sixyear-old boy who died from influenza after been discharged from Riverland General Hospital. Liberal MP for Chaffey Tim Whetstone is calling for the investigation to go further to investigate a "pattern of circumstance". "This is not the first time there's been issues with early

- The Herald Sun (page 7) reports that the federal government will not set new deadlines to prevent young Australians with disabilities from being accommodated at aged care facilities, but has pledged an additional \$7.3 million in the May budget to transition people between 45 to 65 out of aged care facilities. Aged Care Minister Anika Wells has confirmed that the government remains committed to its 2025 target, saying "We meet regularly about a number of issues that span across our two portfolios as part of our broader push to improve the status of the care economy".
- <u>The West Australian</u> (page 10) reports that a shortage of general practitioners in regional Western Australia has prompted communities such as Lake Grace to offer a \$650,000 salary, with extra benefits totalling up to a \$1.2 million package, and comes as local governments increasingly burden the cost of healthcare. "The Australian Department of Health funds over \$1.6 billion for workforce programs each year, primarily designed to help rural and remote communities," a Federal Department of Health spokesperson said.
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 13) reports that Masonic Care Tasmania, now known as Derwent Views, gave only partial information to Coroner Simon Cooper as he tried to investigate if Peter Joseph Guy had a sustained history of falls in relation to a discovered L2 compression fracture. "It is apparent that the response was deliberate. Whether it was deliberately misleading is unclear," Mr Cooper said.
- <u>ABC Online</u> reports that in a statement released by Hannah Mason, a James Cook University's School of Public Health, has warned that Australia's upcoming heat waves as a result of El Niño may exasperate the nation's hospital system, increasing the risk of death in Queensland by 5 per cent and ambulance demand by 12 per cent. In a statement, the Department of Health and Aged Care has affirmed the department's commitment to net zero emissions by 2050, saying "The National Health and Climate Strategy will consider opportunities to build healthy and climate-resilient communities by collaborating with sectors outside of the health system".

But the 2021 Australian Organic Limited Farmer of the Year is deeply disturbed that Australia is the only developed country not to have a standard regulation around the word "organic".

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
