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# EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Australian</u> (page 2) reports more than 80 per cent of Australia's aged care facilities now have 24/7 nursing staff and nurses are available in homes 98 per cent of the time, new government data has shown. Aged Care Minister Anika Wells rejected criticism the government's roll-out of the policy had been more focused on announcements than delivery, saying the government was proud of the reforms and their results.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 7) reports peak medical bodies have called for action to clear a "critical" backlog of patients waiting for elective surgery, with waitlist numbers estimated to be as high as 500,000 in the wake of the COVID pandemic. A letter sent to Health Minister Mark Butler called for a long-term national plan co-funded by federal, state and territory governments aimed at improving the hospital system's capacities.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 7) reports an Australian study mapping brain changes in people with different mental conditions could lead to more targeted treatments for people with depression and schizophrenia, scientists say. Monash University's Turner Institute PhD candidate and research lead Ashlea Segal said she hoped the results will prompt an end to "one-size-fits-all" treatments and encourage clinicians to "develop a personalised understanding of the challenges faced by a given individual".

- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 7) reports a world-first trial run by the Royal Melbourne Hospital will
  assess the benefits of common antidepressant Lexapro as a treatment for the chronic cardiac
  condition atrial fibrillation. Study co-ordinator RMH electrophysiology fellow Youlin Koh said the
  trial had the potential to "revolutionise the management of AF". *Also reported by: <u>Adelaide</u>
  <u>Advertiser, Hobart Mercury</u>*
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 9) reports a form of gene therapy being developed to treat Parkinson's has potential as a cure for serious alcoholism. Animal trials conducted by a team of researchers at Oregon Health and Science University found glial cell line-derived neurotrophic factor treatment had reduced alcohol consumption by 90 per cent.
- The <u>Courier Mail</u> (page 12) reports almost 75 per cent of regional aged care homes are running at a loss, with industry operators saying the sector's crippling staff shortages are having a dire impact outside cities. Aged and Community Care Providers Association CEO Tom Symondson said the sector faced a shortfall of 12,000 nurses, while some facilities were using expensive fly-in-fly-out carers.
- <u>The Guardian</u> reports health experts have welcomed news legislation will be used to implement bans on non-prescription vapes. University of Sydney's school of public health professor Becky Freeman said while legislative changes would take longer, they would add power to the reforms and would be harder to reverse than regulatory changes.
- The Guardian reports PwC failed to disclose conflicts of interest to the government before it was awarded a \$2.3 million contract by the Department of Health and Aged Care to audit the Morrison government's aged care workforce bonus program. The Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation said polling found 70 per cent of aged care workers received no payments through the scheme during its first four months of. A spokesperson for the Department of Health and Aged Care said the contract remains suspended.
- <u>The Guardian</u> reports Queensland doctors are calling for voluntary assisted dying services and associated care to be available under Medicare, saying out-of-pocket costs have created a financial barrier to patients accessing care. The Queensland Voluntary Assisted Dying Working Group has proposed a standardised private billing structure for VAD in lieu of Medicare funding.
- <u>Australian Doctor</u> reports bulk billing rates for GP services have fallen to their lowest levels in a decade, new data from the Department of Health and Aged Care has shown, with 33 million fewer bulk billed GP visits funded over the 2022-23 financial year compared to the previous year. Only 52 per cent of patients treated were bulk billed during the period, a fall from 66 per cent the previous year, while the number of overall GP visits fell by 22 million.

It was the first trial of its kind in the country and believed to be the first in the southern hemisphere after being used to treat 20 drug-affected people in a year. WA Police will now roll out naloxone kits to all officers, even though ambulance officers have been carrying this medicine for a long time.
