- The <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 5) reports Queenslanders and Victorians are facing the highest health insurance premiums in the nation, paying upwards of \$2,000 more for cover than the cheapest state, South Australia. Private Healthcare Australia analyst Ben Harris said "Our health system is not consistent across the country, be it access to Medicare, public hospital systems, private hospitals or doctors. - The Australian (page 17) reports health insurance premiums will likely rise between four and five per cent this year, NIB chief executive Mark Fitzgibbon says. Mr Fitzgibbon said he did not want to pre-empt a decision on premium rises expected from Health Minister Mark Butler later this year, but said the days of premium rises under three per cent were over. "We know hospitals in particular are under pressure, economic pressure, and will be looking for greater compensation," Mr Fitzgibbon said.

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Listeria warning after three deaths in US linked to contaminated ice cream machines

Investigators found the outbreak was linked to ice cream machines that were not cleaned properly at a Frugals restaurant in Tacoma. The six individuals were hospitalised between February 27 and July 22 and genetic fingerprinting from the bacteria inside the milkshakes showed it was the same strain of Listeria that triggered the hospitalisations, the health department said. [...] Each year in Australia around 15 people die and an estimated 150 people are hospitalised with listeriosis, according to Food Standards Australia.
