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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>Age</u> (page 1) reports that former federal sports minister Senator Richard Colbeck has claimed that his Victorian state counterpart Martin Pakula told him in a phone conversation that Victoria would not require additional funding from the Federal Government to assist with covering the costs of holding the Commonwealth Games. The claims come after Victoria was forced to cancel the Games due to cost overruns taking the budget well beyond that outlined in their business case, which also factored in funding from the Federal Government which was allegedly never requested. *Also reported by:* <u>The Guardian</u>
- <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (Page1) reports that NSW Premier Chris Minns will remove laws requiring cruise ship passengers in NSW to be vaccinated against Covid-19, stating the state needs to "move on and get life back to normal." The rules were previously based on advice from the Federal Department of Health and Aged Care, who has announced it is reviewing its guidelines.
- Hobart Mercury (page1) reports that the Tasmania's Health and Community Services Union
 has welcomed news that Southern Cross Care CEO Robyn Boyd has resigned, stating that it is
 a chance for the aged care provider to "restore the faith of staff". HACSU Tasmania secretary
 Robbie Moore is calling on the new CEO to conduct on-site staff and resident meetings, saying

that its "important that SCC's new leadership try to restore the broken-down relationships between SCC management and their staff and residents."

- Hobart Mercury (page 1) reports that ongoing staffing shortages and an ongoing pay dispute with the State Government has the potential to see an exodus of Tasmanian health care professionals leaving to take advantage of recruitment bonuses being offered by other states. "It's up to the government to actually put an offer on the table that's actually going to allow us to retain our graduates here...being competitive with other states and territories who are really trying their best to recruit", Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation state secretary Emily Shepherd said. "I just feel that the government hasn't really caught on to that". Also reported by: Hobart Mercury
- Herald Sun (page 5) reports that Pembrolizumab, sold as Keytruda, a potentially lifesaving
 cancer medication is a step closer to be becoming accessible to a wider range of Australian
 women after the drug was recommended for a federal government subsidy by the
 Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee on Friday. The medication, which works with the
 immune system to fight cancer and stop it returning, was already available on the PBS for a
 number of cancers but may soon have its eligibility criteria expanded for more.
- Northern Territory News (page 12) reports that Home and Away star Lynne McGranger and
 AFL star Leigh Matthews have joined an advertising campaign urging Australians over 50 to
 take part in the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler
 has also urged Australians over 50 to use the free testing kits sent to them in the mail, stating

- <u>Daily Telegraph</u> (page 17) reports that experts are calling for funding to help develop a series of vaccine candidates for the Strep A disease, with infection rates tripling compared to prepandemic levels. The call comes as the nation enters the most dangerous period for Strep A which most affects young children, the elderly, pregnant women. and Indigenous Australians which typically sees cases shoot up during the end of winter and early spring. *Also reported by:* Herald Sun, Adelaide Advertiser, Hobart Mercury, Northern Territory News, The Guardian
- ABC Online reports that the full scope of Adelaide's Women's and Children's Hospital's failure
 to correctly program cochlear implants since 2006 has now come to light. SA Health Minister

 Children's Hospital, with the problems potentially replicated in other parts of the country. Mr
 Picton says a further review into how audiologist are accredited is needed, stating that "Already
 we've raised this with federal health minister Mark Butler [and] we'll be raising it with all the
 other state and territory ministers."

Super expected to ease age pension burden
