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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports that the nation's largest non-government provider of health and aged-care services has warned of an increase in healthcare costs for patients and providers as it called on Health Minister Mark Butler to reconsider his decision to reverse an earlier mandate forcing private health insurers to pay for essential medical devices. Catholic Healthcare Australia health director Caitlin O'Dea said the hospital sector was marching off a "huge funding cliff, adding that "This unexpected U-turn has come as a complete shock to the hospital sector.
- The Herald Sun (page 1) reports that researchers from the Children's Cancer Institute have developed a powerful new tool for screening which drugs will help in the treatment of children with high-risk cancers. "It can help improve outcomes for pediatric cancer patients," said Emmy Dolman, the senior researcher on the study published in the journal Cancer Research, adding that "incorporating drug screening into precision medicine programs is an important step" towards identifying the right treatment for every child with cancer. - The Canberra Times (page 5) reports that ACT Health Minister Rachel Stephen-Smith has played down concerns that Canberra's women's and children's hospital might lose its training accreditation after the draft of a review by the Royal Australian New Zealand College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists found it had failed to meet five of six standards needed. The minister conceded that not enough had been done to address culture problems in obstetrics and gynaecology at Centenary Hospital for Women and Children, saying "We know we have a job of work to do, we're certainly not shying away from that. - The Hobart Mercury (page 5) reports that a Tasmanian coroner has labelled the care of a Launceston woman who died while her ambulance was ramped as "substandard", and said he was pessimistic about the problem diminishing in the near future considering the pressure on emergency departments around the country. Coroner Robert Webster said he couldn't definitively say whether 71-year-old Anne Helen Pedler, who died from lung blood clots and deep vein thrombosis while ramped for 8 hours, would have survived with more timely treatment he noted a number of issues with the response to her health issues that were below standard.
