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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Australian (page 1)</u> reports that a summit, convened by peak provider advocacy group Aged and Community Care Providers Association, has submitted a proposal to Aged Care Minister Anika Wells for a national levy for taxpayers to lift the quality of aged-care in the country. In an issues paper, the group found that "chronic underfunding" of aged care had resulted in both an unsustainable sector and inadequate quality of care.
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 2) reports that the NSW government will expand its urgent response services that deliver care in homes and aged-care centres. The \$124m program will expand to 25 services and will be available to no cost to people aged 65 and older, ensuring they won't need to visit an emergency room.
- <u>The Age</u> (page 3) reports that Minister for Sport Anika Wells has called for the World Anti-Doping Agency to prioritise a review of EPO testing after it was found that Peter Bols first drug test was not a failed test at all. Ms Wells states that athletes need clarity and that "It's in the interests of all athletes in Australia and around the world that any ambiguity in the analysis of synthetic EPO is thoroughly reviewed." *Also reported by: <u>Sydney Morning Herald</u>*

- <u>The Age (page 4)</u> reports that a new Australian study has found one in three younger Victorians who died suddenly from cardiac arrest had used illegal drugs before their deaths, which experts say underscores the hidden impact some illicit drugs can have on the heart. Dr Elizabeth Paratz, the study's lead investigator and a cardiologist at the Baker Heart and Diabetes Institute, said: "we've seen a substantial number of young people using methamphetamines with severe heart failure, to the point that they would require transplant or [they died suddenly]."
- <u>The Australian</u> (page 7) reports that former deputy chief medical officer Nick Coatsworth has stated that Health Minister Mark Butler's decision not to make private health insurers pay for essential medical devices used in surgeries will keep premiums down at the expense of the broader health system. "It doesn't solve the problem for the health system; sure, it helps the viability of insurance companies but it undermines the broader health system," stated Mr Coatsworth.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 7) reports that during the COVID-19 pandemic the Health Department operated a social media team that sought to influence social media companies to remove posts and tweets regarding lawful public protests against Covid lockdowns and vaccine mandates. Freedom of Information requests have revealed the team, based within a "National Incident Room" also requested Twitter to remove posts by then sitting Liberal MP Craig Kelly, who has said the revelations demonstrate the dangers of Labor's proposed "Misinformation Bill".
- <u>The Australian Financial Review</u> (page 9) reports the Andrews government's decision to cancel the Commonwealth Games will face investigation by a state parliament inquiry and the auditor-general's office. The nine person parliamentary inquiry committee will hold its first meetings this month, with an interim report expected around April 2024. *Also reported by:* <u>Canberra Times</u>, <u>Herald Sun</u>, <u>Herald Sun</u>
- <u>The Hobart Mercury</u> (page 10) reports Tasmania's ramping crisis has reached "very extreme levels" with more than 40 per cent of ambulances ramped on arrival, state Greens leader Rosalie Woodruff has claimed. Minister Jo Palmer said the state was working with the federal government on GP shortages which were compounding pressures on emergency wards. *Also reported by: Launceston Examiner*

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Just one alcoholic drink a day can increase blood pressure

New research has added to the evidence that artificial sweeteners like those used in diet soft drinks may be harmful to our health already linked to cancer and cardiovascular disease. Now it's claimed they can contribute to type two diabetes. Major study suggests those consuming up to 18mg a day, just a pinch of any sweetener, had a 69% higher risk of diabetes while aspartame carried a 63% higher risk.

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
