EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- Daily Telegraph (page 1) reports that the Matilda's vs Denmark game has become the most watched TV event in 2023, beating out the AFL and NRL. Federal Sport Minister Anika Wells commented on the support for the Matildas in the FIFA Women's World Cup stating that "Our female athletes are changing sport in this country ... forever." - Daily Telegraph (page 1) reports that a new report by the Royal Flying Doctor Service has found that Australians who live in rural and remote areas are 10 times more likely to die from ischaemic heart disease than Australians who live in the city due to limited access to healthcare services. The report found 22,000 people in remote Australia had no access to any healthcare service within a 60- minute drive of their home, with RFDS executive director Frank Quinlan stating that "Rural and remote communities need rural and remote solutions that are designed with local communities to respond to need." *Also reported by: The Australian, Herald Sun, Courier Mail, Adelaide Advertiser*
- <u>The Daily Telegraph</u> (page 1) reports New South Wales healthcare workers are at risk of accepting more competitive offers interstate unless the Minns government offers a more significant wage rise, unions have warned. The state's health services and nursing unions have

both recently accepted pay deals offered by the government, but said they will continue to lobby for future rises in line with inflation.

- <u>The Australian</u> (page 4) reports that employer groups and aged-care providers have criticised the Labor government's Aged Care Industry Labour Agreement that requires providers to enter into a memorandum of understanding with unions to access foreign workers. The agreement allows unions have special access to workers through inductions that exclude management, and requires providers to offered 76 hours a fortnight of work to local staff before using overseas workers.
- The Australian (page 7) reports that Australian Patients Association CEO David Clarke has stated that if the Andrews explanation for the increase in reported "sentinel" events is correct, than the correct of number of events in the past would be just as high. "Our healthcare system has a historic culture where it's often been hard to get to the truth in difficult situations... I think we're all beginning to understand the scale of some of the problems that are occurring," stated Mr Clarke.
- <u>The Courier Mail (page 8)</u> reports that Clarion Clinic is the first Australian clinic of its kind, offering psychedelic-assisted therapy for Australians suffering from treatment-resistant depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. Patients will enter a program runs for nine months and includes two doses of either MDMA or psilocybin, with Clarion Clinic co-founder Paul Liknaitzky stating that he's seen "very impressive results" in clinical trial participants.
- <u>The West Australian</u> (page 11) reports the government has announced over a million dollars funding for a world-leading Curtin University project tackling poor mental health in school students with speaking, reading and writing challenges. Assistant Minister for Mental Health Emma McBride said the West Australian project will help understandings of how to best support children early on and protect their mental health into the future.
- <u>Herald Sun</u> (page 13) reports that the aged care industry is calling on the Albanese government to reconsider the mandatory 40 minutes of care by registered nurses from October as regional facilities close beds to meet the requirement amidst an ongoing shortage of nurses. Chaffey Aged Care chief executive Darren Midgley stated that "Most are not closing two or three beds, they are closing 25 beds, because they have to lose that many beds to bring their nursing care minutes up into the ratios that are required"

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8CPA negotiations to begin a year ahead of schedule
