- <u>The Saturday Age (page 1)</u> reports that the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has expressed concern over a sharp increase in cannabis prescriptions and warned that such rapid growth is affecting its ability to limit harm in some patients. According to the TGA, "Access of medicinal cannabis products is pushing the boundaries of the intention of these schemes," while a spokeswoman for Health Minister Mark Butler said, "The decision to prescribe medicinal cannabis is a clinical decision taken by a patient's doctor."
- <u>The Herald Sun (page 1)</u> reports that a class action case alleging endemic historic racial mistreatment of former AFL and VFL players will have former North Melbourne and Footscray player Phil Krakouer as the lead plaintiff.
