### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The Weekend Australian (page 1) reports that private hospitals are struggling to manage the influx of patients joining from an overloaded public health system, with rising costs and workforce shortages also putting at risk their ability to offer critical services such as cardiac and cancer surgery.
- The Weekend Australian (page 3) reports that doctors are worried patients prescribed the
  weight loss and diabetes drug Ozempic risk malnourishment due to not getting comprehensive
  healthcare.
- The Adelaide Advertiser (page 2) reports that a state government-ordered independent review into birthing services at Whyalla Hospital has identified a "fractured" relationship between midwives and health officials, contributed to the hospital having suspended its birthing service which the hospital says was due to a lack of staff.
- The Herald Sun (page 19) reports that the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has moved to include more stringent safety warnings on the packaging of the osteoporosis drug Evenity, following the death of two Australians. Calls for the tougher warnings were led by

federal MP, Julian Hill, who said the information sheet for Evenity was sub-standard as it didn't mention death as a possible side-effect.
