- **[The Sydney Morning Herald \(page 1\)](#)** reports that popular cold and flu tablets and allergy medications containing oral phenylephrine continue to be sold in pharmacies and supermarkets despite research showing it provided no benefit.
- **[The Sydney Morning Herald \(page 1\)](#)** reports revelations have emerged about how US multinational conglomerate could have known about toxic chemicals in their products at the same time they were attempting to delay the publication of scientific material which suggested they were hazardous. In 2003 the average Australian adult had the forever chemical PFOS in the blood at 20 times the "safe level" which a scientist employed by 3M had secretly calculated.
- **[The Age \(page 1\)](#)** reports that AFL match-day tests for assessing potential brain injuries should be improved to prevent manipulation by players memorising recall tests, according to two leading neurologists and a former player who retired due to concussion. "We're still using the same sort of procedure or protocol as we have for the last 30 years. We haven't really progressed at all, I don't think, in this space," La Trobe University Professor Alan Pearce said.
- **[The Canberra Times \(page 1\)](#)** reports that Canberra Health Services has denied accusations of a double standard after female staff at Canberra Hospital were subjected to a rule banning

them from wearing shorts, a rule which does not apply to men, in a directive unions have called "blatantly sexist." "It's just outrageous that in 2023, women cannot wear shorts in the workplace, but their male counterparts can, and we just don't understand how that is even a conversation that we're having right now," Community and Public Service Union president Brooke Muscat said.

- **The Daily Telegraph (page 1)** reports that health professionals across Western Sydney have raised concerns that presentations at hospital emergency departments are surging because patients are struggling to afford costly visits to non-bulk-billing GPs.

"We were working on how to best deliver the regional Games model consistent with the agreement that was signed by the government with the Commonwealth Games Federation and Commonwealth Games, Australia," Jacinta Allan, who then led the Commonwealth Games preparation portfolio, said.
- **The Courier Mail (page 1)** reports that Moderna has advanced to late stage trials of a single combined Covid-19 and influenza vaccine "superjab" that has so far shown similar or greater effectiveness than separate doses.
- **The Northern Territory News (page 1)** reports that the Palmerston Medicare Urgent Care Clinic has opened as part of the federal government's plan to reduce pressure on emergency departments and offer bulk-billed urgent healthcare by rolling out 58 clinics across the country. "It's designed to provide people who are suffering some kind of urgent issue like ... a terrible cold or a temperature, or 'I fell off the porch and I think I've broken something'," Palmerston Medicare Urgent Care Clinic chief executive Robyn Cahill said.
