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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Weekend Australian (page 1) reports that a leaked draft timeline of events leading up to the cancellation of the 2026 Commonwealth Games has revealed the new Victorian Premier Jacinta Allan publicly labeled the Games as making "tremendous progress" about an hour before the scrapping of the games was triggered by senior state bureaucrats warning then premier Dan Andrews against further bailouts.
- The Sydney Morning Herald (page 1) reports it has been confirmed by Federal Environmental Minister Tanya Plibersek that three of the most notorious "forever chemicals" made by US manufacturer 3M will be banned in Australia by the end of the year. Minister Plibersek said "After a decade of stagnation and falling behind the rest of the world under the Liberals and Nationals, Labor is taking action on industrial chemicals, including PFAS".
- The Courier Mail (page 1) reports that Queensland Health Minister Shannon Fentiman has vowed to address growing concerns that school bullying Is driving more young people into mental health care, with experts fearing the rise in AI technology could exacerbate the problem. "Every young person should be able to focus on their schooling and social life, free from the scourge of bullying," Ms Fentiman said, adding that the government had funded a \$1.64 billion

Better Care Together plan which will endeavour to "support children and young people experiencing mental health issues".

- The West Australian (page 1) reports a family has sent the Perth Children's Hospital CCTV footage of their young son attempting to end his own life after he was denied access to mental health treatment. Once he was admitted to the 5A Ward, he was attacked by another patient. WA Health Minister Amber-Jade Sanderson said "The State Government is doing everything it can to recruit additional psychiatrists, and I am always open to further solutions".
- <u>The Hobart Mercury (page 7)</u> reports that the state government has decided not to renew the licence for the fundraising arm of Tasmania's Westpac Rescue Helicopter service, which it requires to obtain donations and sponsorships.

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Popular weight loss drugs linked to higher risk of stomach paralysis
