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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Daily Telegraph (page 1) reports that a 114-page independent review into Swimming Australia's treatment of female athletes and coaches has revealed a toxic culture that tolerated the physical and mental abuse, body shaming and public humiliation of girls and women. In a statement, Swimming Australia said, "The Board had considered public release of the full report, however, decided against release due to the significant risk to the confidentiality, and potentially mental health, of those people who had provided input to the panel".
- The Herald Sun (page 26) reports that researchers from Monash University and Alfred Hospital have discovered a potential treatment for sufferers of osteoarthritis in the form of an already available cancer drug which reduces pain and stiffness when taken in small doses. Senior author and Monash University musculoskeletal unit head Flavia Cicuttini said, "I've been looking after my patients for a long time and it's fantastic that now ... we have a drug that we can offer to patients".
- <u>The Guardian</u> reports that a complaint has been lodged by Queensland Police over the treatment of a teenage sexual assault victim at a Queensland hospital, who said she "felt humiliated" from her experience with medical staff. A Queensland Police spokesperson said

they were unable to comment further about the case for "privacy reason," while Health Minister Shannon Fentiman offered an "unreserved apology" to the victim on Thursday.
