The Cooma nursing home where grandmother Clare Nowland was tasered has been found "noncompliant" by the government regulator after ruling the facility had failed to properly report and investigate a separate incident that same month. Yallambee Lodge's risk management systems and practices were deemed non-compliant by the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission last month, after assessors from the Commission showed up unannounced to the facility on July 5, to audit its performance against requirements of two of the eight Aged Care Quality Standards - personal and clinical care and organisational governance.
