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New Australian data reveals youth mental health crisis

New research from the Australian Bureau of Statistics has found that nearly two in five young Australians surveyed during 2020 to 2022 experienced symptoms of a long-term mental health condition. The survey found 38.8 percent of respondents aged 16 to 24 had symptoms of an anxiety disorder, an affective disorder (including depression and bipolar disorder) or a substance abuse disorder in the year before the survey, compared with 21.
