According to the CSIRO, consumer demand for vitamins and supplements in Australia is expected to reach \$5.2 billion by 2030. These capsules, powders, gummies and tinctures are often labelled with big – if vague – claims like "supports immune health" or "improves brain performance". But most supplements have not been rigorously tested for safety or effectiveness, says Dr JoAnn Manson, a professor of medicine at Harvard Medical School.
