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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Hobart Mercury (page 1)</u> reports that the University of Tasmania has secured \$14.8 million in federal government funding from the National Health and Medical Research Council's Ideas Grant Scheme, which will be allocated to seven innovative research projects within the university.
- <u>The West Australian (page 1)</u> reports that new sampling from WA Health has shown a sharp fall in the concentration of the SARS-CoV-2 virus in the state, while hospital data revealed the current wave of COVID infections in WA is beginning to recede.
- <u>The AFR Weekend (page 4)</u> reports that the National Health Survey has revealed that almost 7 million Australians suffer from a chronic mental health condition, the highest level since records began, while the prevalence of other chronic illnesses like asthma, back problems, arthritis and osteoporosis has fallen.
- <u>The Courier Mail (page 3)</u> reports that new data from the 2022 National Centre for Immunisation Research and Surveillance has revealed a decline in the number of children being vaccinated against deadly diseases, with some parts of Queensland registering the lowest rates in the country.

- <u>The West Australian (page 4)</u> reports that new data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics National Health Survey has revealed 65.8 per cent of adults are now considered overweight or obese, putting increased demand on the nation's healthcare system and economy.
- <u>The Guardian</u> reports that state premiers have been accused of a "painful lack of collaboration" by the Australian Medical Association during the COVID vaccine rollout, in its submission to the federal Covid inquiry, with AMA president Professor Steve Robson saying chief health officers were "actively undermined" in public.
