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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The Australian (page 1) reports that a major behavioural research project gauging the mood of Victorians in regard to the state's COVID-19 restrictions and lockdown has been released under Freedom of Information laws, with the research being conducted prior to the "roadmap to freedom" which the state government had previously argued was guided by health advice.
- The <u>Australian Financial Review (page 1)</u> reports that the federal government's Aged Care
 Taskforce has published a poll suggesting Australians would be willing to pay between 30 to 40
 per cent of service costs for aged care services. Aged Care Minister Anika Wells will meet with
 the task force for the final time on Friday.
- The Age (page 1) reports that the state coroner has called on the AFL to empower concussion spotters and independent medical practitioners to remove players from the field to curb the risk of significant head trauma to them following an investigation into the death of a former Richmond player.
