#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

- The <u>Sun Herald (page 1)</u> reports that GPs and immunisation advocacy groups have alleged
  that some clinics are facing shortages of the shingles vaccine Shingrex, which comes as
  Federal Health Minister Mark Butler in October announced free access to the vaccine for over
  five million people over 65.
- The <u>Sunday Telegraph (page 13)</u> reports that Federal Health Minister Mark Butler is considering future funding options for brain cancer research and clinical trials as advocates call for an additional \$21 million in funding.
- The <u>Sunday Canberra Times (page 1)</u> reports that the Australian Bone Marrow Donor Registry has called for more Australian bone marrow donors to address the growing blood cancer rates, with only 70 Australians able to donate to 1000 patients.
- The <u>Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 1)</u> reports that SA Health has confirmed that around 150 people may have been exposed to tuberculosis after a patient tested positive at the Lyell

McEwin Hospital; however, there have currently been no other confirmed positive cases.

- The <u>Sunday Times (page 1)</u> reports that new figures released by WA Health have found that Covid hospital admissions in WA have risen by 41 per cent, with concentrations of strains of coronavirus found in Perth wastewater also rising sharply.
- The <u>Sunday Herald Sun (page 1)</u> reports that growing levels of anxiety and other mental health issues have lowered retention rates among secondary school students by 14 per cent, causing advocates to call for an expansion of mental health services.

## GPs forced to ration shingles vaccine

Seniors wanting to receive the free shingles vaccine the federal government promised would be available last month have struggled to find an appointment, as GPs ration scarce supplies of the shot. While state governments have restricted clinics to between five and 50 doses of the vaccine a month, the federal government maintains there is no shortage. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler said 5 million over 65s and immunocompromised people would be able to access a free vaccine to prevent shingles from November 1.
