Giving drugs a spray Biotech company Argenica Therapeutics, which is developing novel treatments to reduce brain tissue death following types of brain injury such as stroke, has been awarded a grant to develop a non-invasive way to administer the drug ARG-007. The \$419,000 in funding under the WA Government's Innovation Seed Fund Program will support research aiming to develop a new formulation of the drug that is suitable for use in an alternative therapeutic delivery route, making it more acceptable in chronic neurodegenerative conditions such as Alzheimer's disease.
