- The <u>Sydney Morning Herald (page 1)</u> reports that Victorian health authorities have detailed a rapid increase in hospitalisations from the JN.1 Covid-19 subvariant, with an average of 377 hospitalisations last week.
- The <u>Canberra Times (page 1)</u> reports that families in the ACT are struggling to access
 pediatricians to get diagnoses for autism and attention deficit disorder in children under 12,
 which may inhibit their ability to access support.
- The <u>Age (page 1)</u> reports that the nine MDMA overdoes at the Hardmission Festival have renewed calls from the Victorian Ambulance Union for pill testing and changes to drug policing. Data from the Victorian Police has shown that of 277 people searched at music festivals in 2022-23 through the indication of a sniffer dog, drugs were not found 157 times.
- The <u>Herald Sun (page 1)</u> reports that Victorian Liberal mental health spokeswoman Emma Kealy has criticised the health authorities' decision not to send out an emergency drug alert

during the Hardmission Festival where nine people overdosed on MDMA.

 fifteen people in the Kimberly region of Western Australia, bolstering calls for liquor restrictions

The Department of Health's own statistics from the September quarter of 2023-24 showed that 73.2 per cent of GP consults offer bulk billed.

Doctor in dock over steroids

A former Gold Coast stem cell doctor and GP is being investigated by the healthcare watchdog for allegedly inappropriate prescription of drugs, including steroids and "image-enhancing drugs" to "numerous patients and himself" over several years, a tribunal has heard. But the Medical Board of Australia, which is trying to take disciplinary action against Michael Belich, is having trouble finding the former Broadbeach resident to serve him with legal papers.
