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## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Sunday Telegraph (page 5)</u> reports that the federal government is injecting an extra \$188.5 million in funding to the Australian Border Force to help halt the import of illicit tobacco, with Federal Health Minister Mark Butler saying that reducing the availability of tobacco will bring down the number of smokers in Australia.
- The Sunday Telegraph (page 9) reports that Federal Health Minister Mark Butler will launch the Beforeplay campaign on Sunday, which is designed to reduce the stigma around sexual health testing and preventing sexually transmitted infections.
- The Sunday Age (page 7) reports that the Burnet Institute has found that Australia's aggressive Covid-response policy reduced the fatality rate to 33 times lower than the UK and 46 times lower than the US. During 2022-23, Australia's global average fatality rate multiplied 18-fold as it switched to a "living with Covid" strategy.

- The <u>Sunday Times (page 5)</u> reports that WAHealth has recorded 12 Covid-related deaths in the first week of 2024, with infections and hospital admissions on the rise due to the virality of the JN.1 strain.
- The <u>ABC (online)</u> reports that there are currently no recorded statistics for the amount of traffic-related injuries sustained during 2023, the highest fatality year in five years, with the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare set to release a report on the number of 2022-23 injuries halfway through the year.

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# Australia in grips of mammoth Covid-19 wave, but experts offer a silver lining

Australia is unlikely to return to widespread mask mandates, experts say, despite the country grappling with a surge of Covid-19 cases. ### 'Thousands of lives' saved by COVID curbs

The Burnet Institute says Australia's aggressive approach to suppressing COVID-19 in the first two years of the pandemic has been vindicated in saving thousands of lives, leading to a death rate 33 times lower than the United Kingdom and 46 times lower than the United States. But Australia lost its relative global advantage during 2022 and 2023 when excess deaths reached 31,000, an 18-fold increase compared to the first two years an outcome it attributes in part to the shift by governments to "living with COVID" without clear transmission-reduction strategies.

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# MDMA overdose: nine people hospitalised after Melbourne music festival had severe hyperthermia
