Nearly one-third of high school students across Australia who had consumed an alcoholic drink did so with parental permission, a new study has found, while nearly half of those who had drunk in the last week of the survey period had the alcohol supplied by a parent. The report prepared by Cancer Council Victoria for the Australian Department of Health and Aged Care surveyed more than 11,000 students in years 7 to 12 in 2022-23 and found underage drinking had hit historic lows.

Ibrahim points out that one of the monst contagious diseases humans have ever known, in the form of measles, is seeing a resurgence, as significant outbreaks have been reported in India and a few days ago, the World Health Organization reported a 45-fold increase in measles cases in Europe. Shell says that they have seen a number of measles cases in Australia recently, including in NSW, Qld, South Australia, and Vic. She advises people to get vaccinated as soon as possible.
