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Single vaping law coming

A single law for vaping products across all states and territories will shortly be introduced through the Australian Parliament. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler told the ABC yesterday, "I'll introduce it over coming weeks". "Let me just say there will be still one legal pathway to get a vape in Australia," he added. "They'll be required to have prescribed concentrations of nicotine, and they'll only be able to be sold through a pharmacy - not these vape stores or convenience stores - dispensed by a pharmacist, on a prescription by a doctor.

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Melanoma drug newly listed on PBS

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WA vape shops mostly near schools
