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New PIM list reveals high-risk medicines for older patients

A new 'Potentially inappropriate medicines' (PIMs) list unveiled 16 high-risk medicines or medicine classes that could result in negative clinical outcomes, including hospitalisation and death in older patients. The medicines span a range of different classes, from antiemetics such as chlorpromazine and metoclopramide, to centrally active antihypertensives such as clonidine and methyldopa, and 'Z drugs' such as zolpidem and zopiclone, says PIMs list co-author Dr Amy Page FPS, Senior Research Fellow at the University of Western Australia's School of Allied Health Pharmacy and President of the PSA Victorian Branch.
