Pregnant women exposed to extreme heat are more likely to have a premature baby, analysis of more than 1 million Sydney births has shown, sparking a push for more green space to combat the health effects of climate change. The study of more than 1.2 million births over two decades found exposure to extreme temperatures in the third trimester increased the risk of preterm birth by up to 61 per cent, while the risk was reduced for women living in suburbs with more access to green space.

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#### Vapes: The vile tooth

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# Adoptions plummet despite reforms making it easier for carers to adopt

The inquest is examining whether Hampson's cannabis use, his Aboriginal background and previous prison sentences had any bearing on his diagnosis.
