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Asthma drug omalizumab may offer a safety net for those with multiple food allergies: study

In a discovery researchers say could be "life changing" for some, an injection currently used to treat asthma may also benefit people with multiple food allergies. A study published this week in the New England Journal of Medicine found the drug, called omalizumab, can reduce reactions to small amounts of allergens found in nuts, eggs, wheat and milk. The wealthiest Australians have driven a surge in the country's illicit drug consumption over the past

The latest National Drug Strategy Household Survey from 2022-23 has also revealed that fewer Australians are smoking tobacco than ever before but vaping among young people has risen fourfold, as it offers the first national snapshot of Australians' drug and alcohol habits since 2019.

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Asbestos not the only miracle product that became a curse

When humans first learned of its properties, it seemed miraculous. The fibrous mineral did not burn and could be used in everything from cooking utensils to inexpensive building materials. After using it for thousands of years, we only learned of its cost to human health in the mid-1960s and asbestos became a dirty word, something to be feared and avoided. But it had spread throughout Australia, principally as cladding for low-cost houses. [...] But chances are it's been treated with a type of PFAS, a chemical used to make paper greaseproof and water-resistant.

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Are children and young people at risk of asbestos detected in parks, schools and playgrounds?
