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# New Australian laws banning vaping ads 'toothless' without social media enforcement, experts say

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# TikTok bans account of Australian influencer who promoted nicotine pouches in viral videos

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# Townsville University Hospital: Surge in emergency surgeries leaves elective procedures delayed, patients in agony

The Townsville University Hospital finds itself grappling with a spike in emergency surgeries, leaving some patients languishing in pain and fasting for over a week as they await long-delayed elective

procedures. A mum of four, known by the pseudonym Jessica to preserve her anonymity, said she spent most of last week confined to a hospital bed, fasting and grappling with excruciating pain caused by a gallstone lodged in her common bile duct.

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### Vegetables are losing their nutrients. Can the decline be reversed?

In 2004, Donald Davis and fellow scientists at the University of Texas made an alarming discovery: 43 foods, mostly vegetables, showed a marked decrease in nutrients between the mid and late 20th century. According to that research, the calcium in green beans dropped from 65 to 37mg. Vitamin A levels plummeted by almost half in asparagus. Broccoli stalks had less iron.
