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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- The <u>Sunday Age (page 3)</u> reports that the Australian Diabetes Society has called on the federal government to make continuous glucose monitoring devices available to both type 1 and type 2 diabetes patients in the NDIS scheme. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler is awaiting the report from the Standing Committee Inquiry into Diabetes.
- The <u>Sunday Mail Adelaide (page 9)</u> reports that the heart medicine Forxiga has been expanded in the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme to include chronic heart failure of patients with a left ventricular ejection fraction greater than 40 per cent. Health Minister Mark Butler said that the listing would provide a more affordable cost.
- The <u>Sun Herald (page 1)</u> reports that skin cancer experts have criticised Brunae Body's advertisement of its skin tanning product and "accelerators" claiming they will increase melanoma rates, with the Therapeutics Goods Administration set to review the product.
- The <u>Sunday Tasmanian (page 1)</u> reports that the Tasmanian Liberal party has announced a \$275 million funding pledge for the Royal Hobart Hospital if the party is re-elected in the next state election.
