Health Minister Mark Butler said that tripling the bulk bill incentives is a “game changer”.
- The **[Northern Territory News \(page 1\)](#)** reports that Health Minister Mark Butler has confirmed a \$55 million funding extension to the National Critical Care and Trauma Response Centre in the Northern Territory.

## Slight increase to bulk-billing rates after incentives

## Bulk-billed GP visits rise following introduction of incentives for doctors, data shows

The Federal Government is expanding subsidies for abemaciclib (Verzenio) for an additional 2400 Australians living with early-stage breast cancer that has not yet spread beyond the area but has a high risk of doing so.

The Government has expanded subsidies for an aggressive form of breast cancer. Patients will now have access to an advanced treatment that could dramatically improve their prognosis. The two-year course treatment will be funded through the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme with Health Minister Mark Butler saying if it's not part of the PBS, an average Australian will have to pay about \$100,000.
