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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- <u>The Australian (page 1)</u> reports the Federal Government will increase its commitment in the first year of its new five-year hospital funding agreement by 13.5 per cent rising to a total of \$4 billion in 2025-26. Health Minister Mark Butler said, "The new hospital funding agreement will see more than \$13bn of additional commonwealth funds flow to states beyond what they would otherwise have expected," and is "a much fairer deal for all states."
- <u>ABC News</u> reports that Health Minister Mark Butler is working with state health ministers on strategies to ease demand after multiple medical unions claimed that "bed block" at Royal Hobart Hospital resulted in open-heart surgeries and other important procedures being cancelled.
- <u>The Daily Telegraph (page 12)</u> reports that Facebook pages advertising the illegal sale of vapes, which were described by Health Minister Mark Butler as "flouting the law," have been removed by Meta after a determination that they were in violation of Facebook's Community Standards.
- <u>The Herald Sun page 12</u> reports that staff at Colac Area Health who posed as patients during a visit from Victorian Health Minister Mary-Anne Thomas will be required to undergo counselling, though the Department of Health has released a statement saying that investigators have not recommended individual action for the healthcare workers involved.

Leggo believes that they need to have a group that has the oversight and the ability to have the long design overarching view.
