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Free mental health hubs set to fail without more investment

The Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists has said the Federal Government's ambitious cash splash for 61 free mental health centres will fail without targeted investment into the mental health workforce. On Tuesday the Government unveiled its \$27.6 million bid to create a network of 61 mental health services - dubbed "Medicare mental health centres" - to be operational by mid-2026. Federal Health Minister Mark Butler said each centre would have its "clinical capability upgraded to ensure every centre has psychiatrists, psychologists and GPs on call".
