The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) lists more than 420 medicines as being in shortage, 20 of which are at critical levels, including blood thinners, antibiotics and hormone replacement therapy medication. [...] Federal Health Minister Mark Butler referred questions to the TGA, which said managing medicine supply is a priority for the Australian government.
