Hundreds of products have been seized since the start of a crackdown on energy drinks containing unsafe levels of caffeine, SA health authorities say. [...] Food Standards Australia New Zealand has capped the permissible caffeine content of energy drinks at 320 milligrams per litre, the SA government

said that some drinks detected in shops and on shelves during the so-called "blitz" contained almost twice that amount — "equivalent to nine cans of Coca-Cola or three shots of coffee".

More than 100 retailers were inspected during the SA government's nine month blitz on illegal energy drinks, and the results were alarming. These are just some of the 700 drinks seized from Adelaide shelves as part of the crackdown, and popular labels are among the worst offenders. G fuel, bhang and raise energy drinks were all found to have almost double the legal amount of caffeine set under the Australian Food Standards Code. That equates to nine cans of Coca-Cola or three shots of coffee, but it's who the drinks are marketed for that has health authorities here on alert.
