- <u>Sunday Herald Sun</u> (page 1) reports that the Victorian Department of Health has said they will provide an update on the legionnaires outbreak tomorrow, with an investigation ongoing into the source of the 71 confirmed and seven suspected cases.
- <u>The Sunday Times</u> (page 2) reports that a petition from the Health Services Union of West Australia has been delivered to the Deputy Premier urging the WA government to intervene in an ongoing pay dispute after rejecting an offer from the Department of Health.
- The Sunday Canberra Times (page 4) reports that, as part of the federal government's aged care reforms, the Dementia Respite Education and Mentoring Project has been developed to provide education and training to aged care and respite workers to improve dementia respite care.
- The Sunday Mail Brisbane (page 7) reports that RBWH hospital in Queensland is facing a shortage of beds and mental health doctors in the psychiatric emergency unit, with no psychiatric registrar rostered on between 10:30 pm and the morning shift.
- The Sun Herald (page 10) reports that intravenous vitamin infusion businesses are facing calls
 for regulation due to a lack of proven efficacy and amid a shortage of IV products. A
 spokesperson for Health Minister Mark Butler said they are addressing the current shortage,

- saying "the TGA has approved a number of alternative supplies from overseas to supplement the local production".
- The Sun Herald (page 10) reports that fertility organisations in Australia and New Zealand
 have called for an overhaul of the way Medicare defines infertility to include a broader range of
 patients, including LGBTQ people, single women, and single men seeking a surrogate. A
 spokesperson for the Department of Health and Ageing said they are looking at the changes
 and considering the implications it would have for fertility funding under Medicare.

 medical practitioners are responsible for revealing the possible side-effects of prescribed
 medication after a woman was prescribed Ciprofloxacin over the phone for a skin rash and
 developed peripheral neuropathy.
- The Sunday Herald Sun (page 11) reports that the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre has blamed funding cuts for a directive aimed at cutting staff overtime by 30 per cent, while the Victorian government maintains their budget will not affect patient care and does not represent a funding cut to healthcare.
